Silent Night, Holy Night


Son of God, Love's Pure Light

The Light of Christ!

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." - John 1:5

Light is a warm and comforting image, isn't it? Darkness can be frightening. Problems that seem overwhelming at night often seem less so in the morning light. So it is fitting that this season uses the imagery of Christ coming to us as a Light shining in what can sometimes be a dark world.

Lights on our Christmas tree
Candles on the Advent wreath
Candles lit on Christmas Eve
Stars that lead shepherds and
wise men to the baby Jesus
Lights that lead US to the Christ

Then Epiphany . . .

Twelve days after Christmas is Epiphany, which comes from the Greek word for "manifestation" or "revelation". It signifies Christ being revealed as the Son of God to the world. Epiphany traditionally marks the visit of the Magi to the infant Jesus – again following a Light, a star that leads them. The Season of Epiphany then continues until Lent, and celebrates the ways God's Incarnation continues to be revealed.

So don't be too quick to take down those lights after Christmas. The Light of Christ continues to be revealed through Epiphany . . . and beyond!


Prayer for Epiphany Cameron Bellm

What Does it Mean to be a Just Peace Church?

Becoming a Just Peace church is of spiritual value to a congregation's Christian practice. Christians live by faith, God's promises, and living out their covenants. To make a covenant that will consider justice, peace and the sacredness of creation in your church's decisions and life is a big commitment, but it is what the Gospel calls us to do. This was clear in Biblical times, as well as for us today. When we go about our faith practice with the deep belief that this societal engagement within culture does make a difference in God's world, we become aware of God at work in the societal/political setting and in the entire natural world. We open ourselves to truly hearing God's call to join in God's full mission not only to individuals but also to the structures of a world that God loves.

(This is just a brief description from the UCC's Just Peace handbook. It will be explained and discussed in much more detail at the annual meeting.)

Help for Low-Income Clergy The Christmas Fund

Did you know that there are many retired clergy in the UCC that struggle to make ends meets? Some pastors, who served the church faithfully for years, received low salaries and retired with little or no pensions.

It's true – and the UCC has a fund to help!

The Christmas Fund has been caring for active and retired clergy and lay employees of the United Church of Christ for over 100 years, providing emergency grants, supplementation of small annuities and health premiums, and Christmas "Thank You" gift checks each December to our lower-income retirees.

The Christmas Fund is one of the UCC's special mission offerings. United Church of Christ congregations and members have blessed the Christmas Fund with their generosity for many years. This year, your care and compassion will be especially appreciated by those servants of the church who are facing a time of need. Thank you!

Mission to Lesotho

Lesotho is the only sovereign country in the world surrounded by another country. Even though relations with surrounding South Africa have improved since South African majority rule was established in 1994, resource-poor Lesotho still depends upon South Africa for all industrial goods. In exchange, more than 100,000 men (out of a total population of 1.7 million) work in South Africa's gold mines. The massive exodus of Lesotho's males for work in South Africa means that most households are run by women. Lesotho is classified by the United Nations as one of the world's "least developed countries."

Global Ministries (of the UCC and DOC) has a number of ongoing projects to assist the people of Lesotho. They work in cooperation with the Lesotho Evangelical Church (LEC) in Southern Africa, which is one of Africa's oldest Protestant churches, founded in 1833.

Several projects assist with desks, books, sanitation, and other supplies for the LEC operated schools (which are free to students) and working with the Christian Health Association to provide health care.

The Lesotho ministries are made possible by your gifts to Our Church's Wider Mission (UCC) and other special gifts at work through Global Ministries.





For God so LOVED THE WORLD (John 3:16)

7 million people. Worldwide. One day.

A group of UCC clergy and I (and about 7 million others) took to the streets and made history at the No Kings 2.0 Rally. While at the rally, I was overcome by the feeling that I was part of **something bigger** than myself. And I was . . . and the thing is, it reminded me of the feelings I have when I am at church. Please note that sharing this with all of you is not meant to focus on the political side of the No Kings Rallies, but an opportunity to highlight the community aspect of the event as it relates to the community aspect of church!

From the very beginning of my spiritual journey, I was overcome by the feeling that I was about to become part of **something bigger** than myself. And I was . . . I was becoming part of God's purposes and plans and promises for the world. This feeling became stronger and stronger and stronger as I spent more and more time in church. Being a part of church or a faith community is an invitation to participate in **something bigger** than ourselves. Together, we gather to be a part of God's big plans and purposes and promises for our world.

All throughout the bible, God asked our spiritual ancestors to be a part of **something bigger** than themselves. Yup, it's true.

But if y'all don't believe me, let me share a few examples with you from the bible:

Abraham – In establishing a covenant with Abraham, God was inviting him and Sarah to be a part of **something bigger** than themselves. This bigger thing was to become a nation of blessings to the world, born from his descendants who would be as numerous as the stars. To the invitation to be part of **something bigger**, Abraham and Sarah said yes!

Esther — Amid an impending genocide, Esther was called to something bigger than herself. On behalf of her people, Esther was invited to speak up and stand up against the violent plans of the Persian Empire. Mordecai offered up these words of wisdom to Esther "perhaps you were called for such a time as this." To the invitation to be part of something bigger, Esther said yes!

Mary – An angelic visitation led to an invitation to Mary to be a part of **something bigger** than herself too! The angel offered her the divine blessing of birthing the one who would become the savior of the world! To the invitation to be part of **something bigger**, Mary said yes!

Our spiritual ancestors were invited to be a part of **something bigger** than themselves . . . and we are still being invited to be a part of **something bigger** than ourselves too! Just wait and see, y'all! God has **something bigger** in store for us. It might not be joining a protest or a rally (or it might be!) or it could be being part of **something bigger** in our community to meet an unmet need! Whatever it is that God is calling us to do, let us be a church that says yes to God to be a part of **something bigger** than ourselves! Thanks be to God. Amen.

A Pastor's Public Image

That's me. Yup, that fish in the fishbowl in the picture. Life as a pastor is quite a bit like being a fish in a fishbowl. As a pastor, my life is on display for all to see, just like the fish in the bowl. And with it comes

the possibility of judgment, assumptions, rumors, and more. Truth be told, it is hard being the fish in the fishbowl because inevitably someone somewhere at some time will not agree with something I have said, something I have done, or something I have thought.

Because of this, I have been wrestling with about my public image as a pastor. Wrestling with my public image as your pastor has led me to offer all of you five things I am committed to represent in my ministry and in my life. These five categories of representation (listed below) are commitments I am trying to live out each and every day. Yet it must be said that when I go about my life and ministry, there are times when I am representing only one aspect of my ministry and times when I am representing all of my ministry. Church, I want y'all to know what I choose to represent as I go about my life and ministry as your pastor. I choose to represent what it means to be:

- (1) A Good Person There are times when I go about my life anonymously (no one knows that I am a pastor or a follower of Jesus or an ordained clergyperson). In those times, I am representing what it means to be a good person, what it means to be human, and what it means to become the best version of myself.
- (2) A Follower of Jesus There are times when people know that I am a follower of Jesus (when I am wearing a cross or carrying a bible or walking into a church), and I am representing what it means to follow Jesus in this world. I am choosing to walk in the ways of Jesus more and more and more so that I can become more and more and more like him each and every day!

- (3) Ordained UCC Clergy A lot of times people know that I am an ordained clergy person (wearing a clergy collar at a protest, stole at a prayer vigil, or introduced by my title as a reverend at a rally or march), and therefore I am representing the United Church of Christ. My ordination is with the UCC, and therefore whenever I am representing the denomination I am committed to upholding the ministerial code.
- (4) The Pastor of Epiphany and Lockport UCC Sometimes, people know that I am the pastor of Epiphany UCC and Lockport UCC (preaching in the pulpit, introduced as such, or on my business card) and therefore I am representing Epiphany UCC or Lockport UCC.
- (5) A Social Justice Advocate On the front lines of activism and in the work of justice and in prophetic and public proclamation, I am representing what it means to be an advocate of social justice and an ally of the marginalized in our world.

Because of this, there are times when I represent all those roles and there are times when I represent only one of them or a few of them. Did y'all notice something missing from what I choose to represent in this article? As I go about my ministry, I choose to not represent any political party or politician or partisan ideology. Although I am registered with a particular political party (so I can vote in the primary election), my allegiance is first and foremost to Jesus and the kingdom of God. In all I do, I seek to represent what it means to follow the ways of Jesus above all else . . . not to represent a political party or a political candidate.

As y'all watch me in my little itty bitty fishbowl, please know that the example I am trying to set for all of you, the example I am trying to be for all of you, and the example I am living out to the best of my ability is first and foremost what it means to follow Jesus. If there is any judgment, if there are any rumors, if there are any whispers, let them be about how little or how much Jesus others see in me. With God's help, may y'all see more Jesus in me than anything else.
