### Lent Begins

The season of Lent begins with **Ash Wednesday**, which falls on **February 14** this year. We will observe the day with a worship service, which will include the imposition of ashes, in the sanctuary at **6:30 pm**.



Lenten services will then continue each Sunday leading up to Holy Week, the last week of March. Lent is a time for reflection. Attending services, and hearing the messages that Pastor Rick will have to share with us, can help prepare our hearts and minds to receive the gift of Easter.

### Palm Sunday - March 24, 10:30 am

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday. Our morning worship will center on the theme of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, leading to the passion story of the Christ.

### Maundy Thursday – March 28, 6:30 pm

Our journey through Holy Week continues with Maundy Thursday. This moving service centers on the Last Supper of Jesus and his disciples. As they did on that evening, we will share Holy Communion together.

#### Easter Sunday – March 31, 10:30 am

The events of Holy Week culminate in the glorious celebration of Easter Sunday. Our service will include the sharing of Holy Communion.

### Filling Our Pulpit

#### To Our Members and Friends,

As you are aware, Pastor Rick will be retiring at the end of March. In preparation for that time, the Church Council has been having discussions with Rev. Gary Ferner from the UCC New York Conference. Part of his job is to assist churches in finding pastors when they have a vacancy in the pulpit.



Rev. Ferner recommended a pastor for us to consider. She is Rev. Hope Schwartz, an outstanding young UCC minister who expects to be granted approval for ordination in the next few months. She received her Master of Divinity from Northeastern Seminary in 2021. Rev. Schwartz lives in Newfane, and is currently serving as the half-time pastor for Epiphany UCC in Clarence Center, as well as a spiritual counselor for Niagara Hospice. She is seeking to pastor another church on a half-time basis to gain full-time employment.

The Church Council has met with Rev. Schwartz and was impressed with her qualifications and gifts for ministry. The Council is seriously considering hiring Rev. Schwartz as our designated pastor for one year, with the expectation of calling her to be our permanent pastor at some point during that year.

We at Lockport UCC have had experience with part-time pastors, and understand that it means being sensitive to their time restraints. However, this would be our first experience sharing a pastor with another church.

Sharing a pastor involves another level of time considerations, including the fact that she needs to do worship services at both churches. This, of course, means that both churches have to adjust their worship schedule.

The Council will continue to have discussions with Rev. Schwartz and Rev. Ferner about what will be needed to make this shared pastorate work out. We will keep the congregation informed of our progress.

## My Thoughts by Rev. Barbara Toll

Anyone who knows me knows that winter just is not my season. I hate being cold, and I miss sunlight in the evening. I've tried winter sports in an effort to embrace New York winters, but my efforts are forced. I have not figured out how to enjoy these months of snow and ice. I would spend this time entirely inside under a fleece blanket if I could. The long walks I enjoy over the summer wouldn't even enter my mind this time of year, but my dog does not understand my desire to hibernate! Cosmo doesn't care if it is only 20 degrees outside. He still requires a walk of at least two miles each day.

We often walk at a fairgrounds near my home. There is enough open space to take Cosmo's leash off and throw a ball. Recently I took him off leash with fresh snow on the ground. As I trudged through the snow, trying not to get any in my boots, I couldn't help but smile. What I saw in front of me could only be described as pure delight. Cosmo didn't run; he frolicked. He moved in a way that could only be described as more rabbit than dog, bouncing through the snow. You might think I'm crazy, but I'm certain that animal was even grinning.

I'm not sure I can remember the last time I was that overjoyed about anything. What would it be like if I could be so overwhelmed with joy that I frolicked? What would this world be like if more of us experienced such delight that we bounced through our day? Maybe dogs have something to teach us.

Cosmo can delight in the snow because he isn't worried about it melting into his fur when we get home, making him cold for the rest of the day. He isn't thinking about how much nicer the fairgrounds are on a warm summer evening. He is just entirely in the moment. All he knows is right now. No worrying about the future, and no longing for the past. So he can't help but embrace all that God has for him in the present moment. I'm convinced that the more we can just be with God in the present moment the more we connect with the Divine. I'm convinced that allowing the goodness around us to overwhelm our being will allow us to better embody God's Spirit in the world. So when I put on my snow boots this afternoon, I intend to take a deep breath and embrace the day. Won't you join me?
