The Church of the BIG Tent

One of the messiest and most miraculous characteristics of the UCC is its identity as a united and uniting church which has earned us the name of the Church of the BIG Tent. One of the most meaningful moments of my time as a delegate at General Synod 2025 was the opportunity to participate in calling the UCC to continue to be a big tent church. To be a big tent church, we must continue to make more room for others, we must continue to build a bigger table, and we must continue to add more chairs for all to join us.

As a delegate, I was granted voice and vote on the work placed before the delegation at General Synod. And in this work, we were presented with two prudential resolutions that reflected the opportunity to make our tent bigger as a church. Our tent would become bigger if we voted yes to establish partnerships with the Evangelische Kirche in Deutschland and the Iglesia Evangelica Unida de Puerto Rico. None of these churches identify as UCC but instead seek to maintain their own identity while establishing a partnership of full communion with the UCC. Towards this end, full communion would make it so that the churches would allow and acknowledge the ministry of the partner churches in communion, pastoral credentials, and more.

It may seem this would not be a difficult decision to make as a church that is known as the church of the big tent. But there was some discussion about the challenges presented in the establishment of these partnerships . . . particularly of potential partnership with the Iglesia Evangelica Unida de Puerto Rico.

Why? Because those gathered for synod found themselves caught up in focusing upon what divided us instead of what united us. What was it that the two churches differed upon? It was on the affirmation of LGBTQIA+ persons in the church. Now, y'all know how important this is to me as a justice issue and theological commitment. But should this position be the dividing line for who is welcome into our big tent church?

I don't think so. You might be surprised and wondering why I would not consider it a line that marks who is in and who is out of the big tent of the UCC. Let me tell you why, Church! It is because of my belief that nothing is impossible for God because anything is possible with God!! Because the UCC is a united and uniting church, I am hopeful that by being in relationship with others from different faith traditions and denominations that we become our best selves when we are together, we grow more together, and we do more together!

Let us be the Church of the Big Tent that makes room for all to come together in unity

Let us be the Church of the Big Tent where everyone is welcome, no matter who they are or where they have been or where they are going on life's journey

Let us be the Church of the Big Tent where we believe with all of our hearts and all of our souls and all of our minds that nothing is impossible for God because all things are possible with God! Thanks be to God. Amen.



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

A Pastor's Schedule

Y'all, I have the best job in the world! There is nothing else in the world that I would rather do than be the pastor of Epiphany UCC and Lockport UCC. But y'all know that, for I have said it many many many times! But the reason I love my job is not the reason most people think. Most people think that I love my job because I only have to work one day a week being a pastor!

Did you know that? Apparently, it is common knowledge that pastors only work one day a week! I think I missed the memo! Because y'all, as a pastor I am always on the clock! 365 days a year. 24 hours a day. 7 days a week. This is because as clergy I am always "on-call" to be available to respond to pastoral care concerns, crises, or accidents at a moments' notice.

Even if pastors were not always on-call, there is quite a bit more work to do than only preach on Sunday. Pastors have more work to do than most people think! Let me share with you some of the work assigned to pastors:

- · Nurture one's own faith and the faith of others by listening for God's voice through prayer, study of the bible, devotional reading, and worship
- · Offer opportunities to others to study the bible, book studies, trainings, sermons, and other educational opportunities
- · Visit sick and shut-ins in homes, hospitals, rehab and nursing facilities
- · Offer pastoral counseling and spiritual direction
- Officiate funerals and weddings
- Continuing education requirements
- · Lead meetings and manage the work of the church
- · Foster connection to the wider community and its needs
- · Speak prophetically against injustice through protests, statements of witness, and other forms of community organizing
- · Build community with other faith traditions, denominations, and houses of worship to strengthen the wider faith community
- · Assist with fundraising events, community events, and fellowship events

Y'all . . . it is simply not possible to do all the things on that list while only working one day a week! And truth be told, y'all I am useless after church on Sundays. Like many other pastors, I take a nice nap after worship on Sunday as often as I can! If I had only one day a week to do my job, I could never get it all done and never get a post-church nap!



Words Matter to Me

Words matter, Church. It matters the words we use to talk about people and to talk to people. It matters the names we call people and the names we are called. But I must share with all of you something silly that happens to me a lot . . . especially when someone first finds out that I am a pastor. People apologize to me profusely, for what I consider to be a silly little indiscretion. What is their indiscretion? They said a swear word in front of a pastor!! Gasp!!

What most people do not know is that there is quite a bit more to being a pastor than policing the language of those around me. Like so much more, y'all. Of course, words matter. But it is not my sole purpose as a pastor to police language. If I were to the police language of others, I would much rather invite them:

- · To refrain from name-calling, derogatory words, hate speech, or verbal threats
- To use a person's personal pronouns that are shared with us instead of using the incorrect pronouns
- To reject racist and sexist and ableist and heterosexist language in all of its forms

Church, these are all the ways that I would rather police the language of others rather than catch them accidentally dropping a swear word in my presence. Y'all should know that swear words do not bother me whatsoever, except when the words are being used in a threatening manner to another person. And y'all have already heard a few swear words come out of my mouth too . . . but never in the pulpit!

As you can imagine, as a pastor I am much more concerned how we use words than the words themselves. I am deeply concerned about the use of words to hurt and harm people. The adage "sticks and stones may break my bones, but words could never hurt me" is simply untrue. Words have power when used as a weapon to hurt and harm. Likewise, words have power when used as a remedy to heal and help. Let us be less concerned about policing others for the swear words that slip out and more concerned about how we use words to hurt and harm.

Let us choose to use our words to heal and help others today, tomorrow, and all the days to come. With God's help, we can!

Community at the Asian Rural Institute

I arrived here at the Asian Rural Institute (ARI) only five weeks ago, in the middle of the winter season, when the farm population dwindles and prepares for a new class of Participants to arrive. For nine months out of the year, there are about 30 students (called Participants), primarily from Asia and Africa, who study here to learn organic agricultural practices, servant leadership, and sustainable community building.

Ultimately, our work at the ARI is to empower these Participants and their respective home communities to build sustainable, self-reliant, and peaceful rural futures.

At this point, there are still several more weeks until the Participants arrive and begin their nine month journeys here, but I can feel the excitement and anticipation for their arrival building day by day. I feel incredibly blessed to have the opportunity to work and live alongside such a diverse and passionate group of rural leaders.

A Place to Call Home

I worked with a nonprofit called The Samaritans in Green Valley, Arizona, United States. Their mission: to offer humanitarian support to migrants facing life-threatening challenges. The Samaritans operate in the Sonoran Desert along the United States-Mexico border, spanning over 260,000 square kilometers. Tragically, the U.S. government has weaponized this desert landscape to deter migration through a policy known as Prevention through Deterrence. The idea behind this policy is to push migrants into more hostile terrain, hoping to force them to turn back or face death.

In response, The Samaritans conduct desert searches to locate and assist migrants. When they find them, they offer medical care, food, and water helping to prevent death in the unforgiving desert. The most significant obstacle they face is the extreme lack of water. Migrants are being forced into vulnerable, dangerous situations because the proper channels for safe migration and support are either inadequate or nonexistent.

The House of Many Cultures

I have been placed in Sicily, Italy to work with Mediterranean Hope, an organization dedicated to supporting migrants through its local reception center, The House of Many Cultures. This community center provides essential services to individuals in vulnerable situations, most of whom have recently arrived in Italy through Humanitarian Corridors. In addition to adapting to a new culture and language, they face uncertainty in securing basic necessities.

The House of Many Cultures steps in to bridge this gap, offering housing, meals, cultural orientation, language instruction, legal assistance, healthcare support, and more.

At present, there are about 40 residents, which include family units with children (ranging from ages 3 to 19) and young adults.

Faith Over Firearms: Stop the Gun Violence Epidemic!



Every day, 125 people are killed by guns in the U.S. Firearms are the leading cause of death among children and teenagers in the United States. We owe it to our children and to all those we have lost to gun violence to end this epidemic. Children should never have to fear for their lives at school, yet kids as young as five years old must regularly participate in active shooter drills. What does it say about our nation's morals if we value unregulated gun ownership over children's lives?

Even as we mourn the thousands killed by guns every year, our government refuses to act. In fact, the current administration eliminated the White House Office of Gun Violence Prevention and cancelled community violence intervention (CVI) programs in March. CVIs are evidence-based programs that seek to end gun violence where it is most prevalent. Critically, these efforts are rooted in community-led and public health-supported models—with the experiences of those most impacted by gun violence informing the intervention programs. Many congregations help support these community efforts and are already important parts of the community violence intervention effort, making it a vital part of our ministry as people of faith.

We refuse to sit by and allow gun violence to be normalized as part of everyday America. Our faith instructs us to grieve with those who are mourning and let our prayers become actions. To not just lament but work to build a world restored. Our faith compels us to declare that a culture of violence and death is not inevitable. We are not powerless in making these changes; we can take steps to end gun violence.

As Congress continues the fiscal year 2026 appropriations process, they must robustly fund CVI with \$200 million and exert their constitutional authority over spending as the first branch of government. Congress must hold this administration accountable for its dangerous actions.

Tell your elected leaders to summon moral courage and take immediate action by calling on Congress to include in its upcoming appropriations bill \$200 million in funding for the community Violence Intervention program.
